YEAR AT A GLANCE

On behalf of the Junior League of Shreveport-Bossier, Inc., I am pleased to share this annual report with you. For over 81 years, the JLSB has played a vital role in shaping our community. It is difficult to drive through town and see a nonprofit organization that has not been touched by the Junior League of Shreveport-Bossier. We take our mission seriously and strive not only to improve the community around us, but also to develop our internal community through training, educational, and leadership opportunities provided to our members.

Through our Project Research and Development initiative, we are continually evaluating the needs of our community as well as the effectiveness of our current programs. Our community impact achieved through nine current community projects is far reaching. During the 2013-2014 year, 237 Junior League members spent 16,296 hours in their placements. This generous investment, coupled with JLSB money expended in support of our mission, resulted in a value given to the community of \$390,583! Whether playing Bingo at University Health with hospitalized children, reading with an incarcerated parent at the Bossier Parish Medium Security Facility, providing normalcy and sincere support to victims of domestic violence and their children, or instructing middle school kids on proper childcare techniques, Junior League volunteers are achieving our goal of promoting voluntarism and improving communities.

Our membership is strong, engaged, and committed to our mission. This commitment is evidenced by the fact that although 90 percent of our members work outside the home, they still find the time and enthusiasm to support the mission of the JLSB. The JLSB in return offers many opportunities for the development of our members. These opportunities include leadership building and personal development through strategic planning, management, budgeting, public relations, marketing, event planning, fund development, research, and community activism. Through hands-on training as well as formal educational seminars and conferences, Junior League volunteers are indeed developing the potential of women. The skills learned within the confines of the Junior League will most assuredly be multiplied as League members take these skills into their personal, professional, and other volunteer-based circles of influence.

As I look back on the 2013-2014 year, I am humbled by what this amazing group of women has accomplished. Our financial position is strong and leaves us poised for much success as we transition to the 2014-2015 leadership team. ABOUT OUR MEMBERS

Our membership resides in a geographic area including Caddo, Bossier, DeSoto, and Bienville parishes. 80% of our members live in Caddo Parish (76% in Shreveport); 19% live in Bossier Parish (15% in Bossier City); and 1% live in outlying parishes.

BETWEEN THE LINES

Children of incarcerated parents are the focus of this project. Started in 2012, Between the Lines promotes literacy and strengthens family bonds between incarcerated parents and their children. Through our partnership with the Bossier Parish Medium Security Facility, parents choose a book for their child, and a Junior League volunteer makes a recording of each parent reading the book aloud. The recorded readings are then sent to the children in a CD format along with a new gift-wrapped book. Books are donated by Junior League members and other local organizations. Over 75 families have been impacted by the Between the Lines Program.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

One in four women will experience domestic violence during her lifetime. In partnership with Providence House, the Domestic Violence Program aims to educate the public and to provide information about services provided by Providence House. Domestic Violence volunteers participated in an outreach project at the Louisiana Boardwalk doing just that. Throughout the remainder of the year, volunteers worked directly with the residents of Providence House "Safe House." Our volunteers were welcomed by the children living with their mothers at the safe house as they helped them create trick-or-treat bags for Halloween and ornaments at Christmastime. For Valentines Day, the safe house residents received flowers and their children made valentines—small gestures to ensure each of them knows how precious they are to our volunteers. This program touched the lives of approximately 100 women and children during the current year.

DONE IN A DAY

Done in a Day offers JLSB volunteers the opportunity to provide volunteer support for community projects and events that can be accomplished in a one-time evening or weekend effort. All projects selected fit our mission. During the current year, our Done in a Day volunteers worked with the Shreveport-Bossier Rescue Mission, the Northwest Louisiana Food Bank, Susan's Closet, the Renesting Project, Volunteers of America, Heart of Hope, Girls on the Run, and the Cinderella Project.

HEALTH LITERACY INITIATIVE

This summer project promotes healthy lifestyle choices to school-age children. Members act as health educators teaching children about fitness, tobacco use prevention, animal safety, nutrition, stranger danger, fire prevention, table manners, good financial practices, and oral health. Volunteers also provide crafts and healthy, fun snacks that coincide with the theme of the session. The Junior League partnered with the Boys and Girls Clubs to bring this program to over 50 fourth- and fifth-graders each Tuesday and Thursday for seven weeks throughout the summer.

KIDS IN THE KITCHEN

The goal of Kids in the Kitchen is to reverse the trend of childhood obesity by empowering youth to make healthy lifestyle choices. Volunteers educate children about exercise and nutrition with a hands-on program that includes making healthy snacks and playing games to get them moving. At the Red River Revel, about 7,000 4th grade students participate in this program during field trips. In the spring, JLSB volunteers take the program to various community centers during after-school programs. Each child was given an outdoor play ball, a water bottle, a daily menu sheet, and a healthy snack.

LSUHSC BINGO

Once a month, Junior League volunteers spend a Thursday evening playing Bingo with the children hospitalized at LSUHSC (now University Health). These volunteers are instrumental in making a positive difference in a child's hospital stay. The children are invited to play Bingo in the Child Life Playroom. If they are not able to leave their rooms, the game is broadcast on a closed-circuit television system on the pediatric floor of the hospital and winners can call in when they win. This program is a wonderful way to relieve the anxiety and fear often associated with a hospital stay—especially through the eyes of a child. After Bingo, volunteers lead the children in a themed craft project. Win or lose, every child is able to choose a prize from our prize bucket. Since the closing of Sutton Children's Hospital, the number of pediatric patients has greatly increased, allowing this project to have even greater impact in our community.

RED RIVER REVEL ARTIST FOR A DAY

Each weeknight and all day on weekends during the Red River Revel, Junior League Volunteers can be found in the Artist for A Day tent in the children's area. Members assist children with fun and creative projects that are very often led by local artists volunteering their time to be a part of this project. One of the only free activities for children at the Revel, each child is able to show his or her creativity by painting, making puppets, sculpting model magic monsters, making Mod Podge frames, and creating sun catchers. Not even the rainy days at the Revel could keep over 3,000 children from visiting the Artist for a Day tent.

SAFE SITTER

Brand new this year, the Safe Sitter program prepares middle-school-age children to be effectively trained babysitters. All too often, older children are left home to look after other children of all ages with little or no training for even the simplest of tasks. Volunteers in this program teach the participants about the basics of child care, first aid, the Heimlich maneuver, general safety, and even how to start their own business. This program was rolled out by being taught to members' children and grandchildren and was then taught twice free of charge at the Boys & Girls Clubs and Community Renewal. We look forward to expanding this program to include more participants in the upcoming year.

SUPER SAFETY SATURDAY

In partnership with Sheriff's Safety Town, the Junior League of Shreveport-Bossier coordinated our fourth annual Super Safety Saturday event. Over 1,000 people including children and families, local nonprofit organizations, government agencies, and members of law enforcement attended this free community event. In the Health and Safety Fair tents, participants learned about various health and safety issues through interactive games and handouts given at each station. The Touch-a-Truck area included a helicopter and bookmobile as well as many other emergency, construction, transport, waterway, and military vehicles. Participants were able to see these vehicles up close and climb in for an even closer look. The Family Fun Zone was filled with bounce houses, games, prizes, and music, bringing the fun to the safety fair. Bicycle, storm, and water safety were presented by deputies in the kid-sized "city" of Safety Town. The event was rounded out with a child seat inspection and bike rodeo hosted by the Caddo Parish Sheriff's Office.

COOKBOOK SALES

Our longest running source of income comes from cookbook sales. We are pleased to offer three unique books including the award-winning cookbook *Mardi Gras to Mistletoe* featuring 12 months of festivals, events, and more than 200 seasonal recipes. *Revel*, originally published in 1980 and then reissued in a 20th anniversary edition in 2000, has sold over 50,000 copies and includes party menus for each of the four seasons. A *Cook's Tour* turned 50 this year! Published in 1964, it features dishes elegant enough for fine dinner parties and casual enough for picnics and is truly a journey back into your grandmother's kitchen. Sales of our three outstanding cookbooks allow the JLSB to move our mission forward.

REVEL PEPSI SALES

The now world-famous Red River Revel Arts Festival was founded by the Junior League of Shreveport-Bossier and given to the City of Shreveport in 1976 as a bicentennial gift. The Revel is held annually in October on the Shreveport riverfront and attracts thousands to the area. The Junior League continues to support the Revel by providing over 600 volunteer hours selling Pepsi products during the festival.

JUNIOR LEAGUE MARKET

The Junior League Market celebrated its 13th anniversary this year and it was "lucky 13" indeed. The three-day spring shopping extravaganza attracted merchants from all over the country providing shoppers with a vast array of unique products and services. In addition to the general shopping activities, this year's Market provided something for the whole family—Girl's Night Out for the ladies, Breakfast with the Bunnies for children, and a Patron Party where party-goers enjoyed food, friends, and fun. The men were treated to the "Man Cave" while the ladies purchased chances to win a 1-carat diamond in our champagne raffle. The Market is the JLSB's largest fundraiser. Its success ensures that the JLSB will continue to touch the lives of families at risk in our community for years to come.
